Comments for L'Anse Township Planning Commission

- Our group has more than 100 members and is growing daily
- The concerns in the white paper we presented at the April Township board meeting (published in April 18 L'Anse Sentinel) have not been addressed
 - Adequacy of the data supporting the wind farm proposal
 - Environmental damage
 - o Effects on wildlife
 - o Effects on tourism
 - Rush to judgment
- Continuing research has confirmed our concerns and added new ones
 - When turbines come property values plummet. Local deals are being delayed pending the wind farm decision.
 - When turbines come wildlife move out, birds are killed
 - When turbines come tourists don't; governor of Maine declared a moratorium due to tourism losses
 - When turbines fail fires have to burn themselves out; wide exclusion zones are needed to protect from problems like mechanical failure and ice throw.
 - Emerging trend (e.g. Minnesota) changes tax basis from property to power output.
 When turbines are not turning, revenue is not being generated.
 - Claimed "new tax revenue" amount has decreased by 1/4 from \$34M to \$25.6M. This still represents a best case. Decisions should be based on an informed range of estimates best and worst and account for any identified risks. If 35 turbines were built (the low end of the range) revenues would decrease by about another 1/3. The estimate is not credible and is inadequate to support such a major decision.
 - Many people we talk to do not appreciate that their electric rates will not decrease or that power will be distributed to the grid.
- We reaffirm the recommendation in our white paper that we not rush judgment. Any decision to make a material change to the zoning code should be delayed pending resolution of concerns and input from agencies such as Michigan DNR and US Fish and Wildlife Service.
 - Existing zoning is adequate
 - We intend to petition for a Moratorium to the L'Anse Township Board very soon and we urge the Planning Commission to make the same recommendation.
